After Action Report -Battle of Medina de Rio Seco, 14 July, 1808..... By Mark Pawelski

The following game was played last year using the Age of Eagle rule set.

The battle began with the long-range cannonade of General Maceda's battery by LaSalle's foot battery positioned on *Paramo de Valdeouevas* opposite the Spanish Advance Guard Division. Although initially ineffective, the French gunners soon found the range and silenced this battery. General Merle's division began their assault against Cagigal's division that held the Spanish right. Merle advanced with the 86th Ligne on the left and the 119th Ligne on the right. Merle's 6-pound foot battery, initially centered between the brigades, moved to the left flank of the division.

Mouton's division debouched from its hilltop position on the French right and began marching towards the unoccupied slopes on the Spanish left flank. Although some uncharacteristically sloppy staff work initially delayed LaSalle's troopers, the dashing cavalier finally got his two cavalry brigades moving against the Spanish left-center.

Marshal Bessieres' two brigades comprised of the Garde Fusilier-Chasseurs and the 120th Ligne began their advance against the Spanish center. There was no subtlety to the Marshal's battle plan. He simply threw everything he had against the waiting Spanish enemy!

All was not idle on the Spanish side of the battlefield. The aging Generalissimo Cuesta, being unable to sit a horse, was seen kicking up dust clouds as his carriage moved throughout his command. Unable to effectively coordinate his army's movements, the brigades under his command hesitated before finally lurching to life. They began their advance towards the open Spanish left flank and a potential head-on collision with Mouton's division.

Meanwhile the divisions of Maceda and Portargo stoically awaited the storm gathering to their front. The Spanish troops nervously shifted in the ranks but held firm. It was on the Spanish right that disaster would strike!

The impetuous General Cagigal, away from the immediate control of General Blake thought he saw an opportunity developing. His four infantry brigades and small cavalry force could possibly catch the French unawares. Seizing the initiative (or so he thought) Cagigal ordered his division forward. It was a bold but fatal decision. The serried French columns shook out into supported line just in time to receive the Spanish attack. Rolling volleys smashed into the two lead brigades. The Regimento Hibernia was shattered and the Milicia Provinciales de Galicia was thrown back in disorder. Merle's artillery greeted the Dragones de la Reine and shot down an entire squadron. Only the Regimento del Rey had some success, temporarily halting the advance of the 86th Ligne.

More volleys ripped into the *Regimento de Zaragoza* carrying away forty per cent of the brigade. Despite the slaughter, Cagigal's division stubbornly clung to their position.

In the center, LaSalle's 10th Chasseurs a cheval struck the *Regimento de Toledo* just as they formed square. The Spanish were forced back initially but rallied and the cavalry withdrew with losses to both sides littering the slopes. The Guard Chasseurs a Cheval had better suc-

cess against the neighboring *Regimento de Aragon*. They drove this brigade from its position atop the *Teson de Mondolin* but withdrew as the remnants of the infantry rallied and formed square supported by a Spanish 6-pound battery. The cavalry had served its purpose. The Spanish no longer held the high ground.

In the center, Bessieres' brigade slammed into the hapless Advance Guard under Maceda. With the supporting artillery destroyed the *Regimento Ligero Cataluna* and the *Granaderos Unidades* were hard pressed to hold their forward positions. The Catalonian Lights were overwhelmed and destroyed by the 120th Ligne in a series of firefights and close assaults. The combined grenadiers faced off against their opposite number. Despite losing a third of their strength they gave ground slowly and withdrew on the supporting brigades of Portargo's division. The Old Guard Volante battery, moving in support of LaSalle's charges, maintained a brisk but ineffective fire at these brigades.

It was now that disaster struck on the Spanish right. The Galacian Militia, disordered by its close-range musket duel and melee with the French broke and fled the field. Another squadron of the Reine Dragoons was shot away and the remnants outraced the infantry to the rear.

With three infantry brigades, a battery and his cavalry support eliminated, General Blake issued the order for the remaining elements of his army to withdraw from the battle he had hoped to avoid. General Cuesta, sweating in his carriage, noticed the rearward movement of Blake's survivors. Although his Army of Castile had hardly fired a shot in anger and was just now approaching the ridge, he could not face the French alone. The battle of Rio Seco had ended in a crushing defeat for the Spanish forces.
